



## Women's Issues Poll September 2023

- CLIENT:** Women's Rights Party
- POLL DATES:** Monday 18 to Thursday 22 September 2023. The median response was collected on Wednesday 21 September 2023.
- TARGET POPULATION:** Eligible New Zealand voters.
- SAMPLE POPULATION:** Eligible New Zealand voters who are contactable on a landline or mobile phone or online panel.
- SAMPLE SIZE:** 1,050 respondents agreed to participate – 750 via phone and 300 via online panel.
- SAMPLE SELECTION:** A random selection of 15,000 nationwide phone numbers and a random selection from the online panel.
- WEIGHTING:** The results are weighted to reflect the overall voting adult population in terms of gender, age, and area.
- SAMPLE ERROR:** Based on this sample of 1,000 respondents, the maximum sampling error (for a result of 50%) is +/- 3.1%, at the 95% confidence level.
- CODE COMPLIANCE:** This poll was conducted in accordance with the Research Association New Zealand Code of Practice and the International Chamber of Commerce/European Society for Opinion and Market Research Code on Market and Social Research.

34% of respondents support allowing men who identify as women entry into single-sex spaces for women and girls, and 47% are opposed.

More men than women are supportive, as are younger respondents. Also respondents in the major cities are more likely to be supportive than respondents in provincial cities, towns or rural areas.

The Christchurch City Council allows any man who identifies as a woman to have entry into all single-sex women's and girls' spaces in council-owned venues, including the women's session at Te Pou Toetoe: Linwood Pool. Should city councils implement these policies without transparent and fully informed public consultations?
